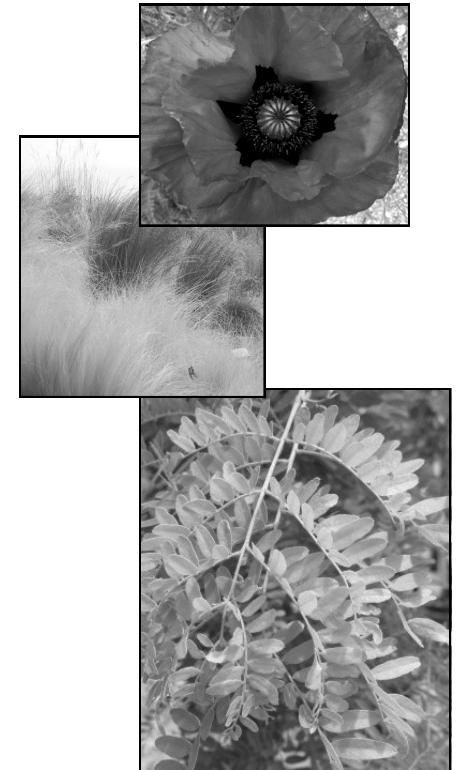

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Getting Started

Water-Smart Plant Selections

Below is a list of many of the drought tolerant plants we carry. We would be happy to help you discern what will work for you.

NEW PLANTINGS!

Just a note about new plantings... Even though a plant is considered drought tolerant, you WILL have to give it regular water until the roots become established. This will definitely take one year and could take as many as 2-3 seasons. During the growing season, twice a week watering is sufficient for many hardy, drought tolerant plants. But, many people new to Colorado may not realize that winter watering is also essential in our climate. We recommend at least once a month watering in winter when temps are at least 40 degrees. This is especially true for evergreen trees and shrubs!

*Perennial Grasses

With the exception of Northern Sea Oats, MOST of the ornamental grasses we offer are drought tolerant. They also hold up well in windy sites, are deer resistant and add winter interest.
